YPAR Training: Week 2

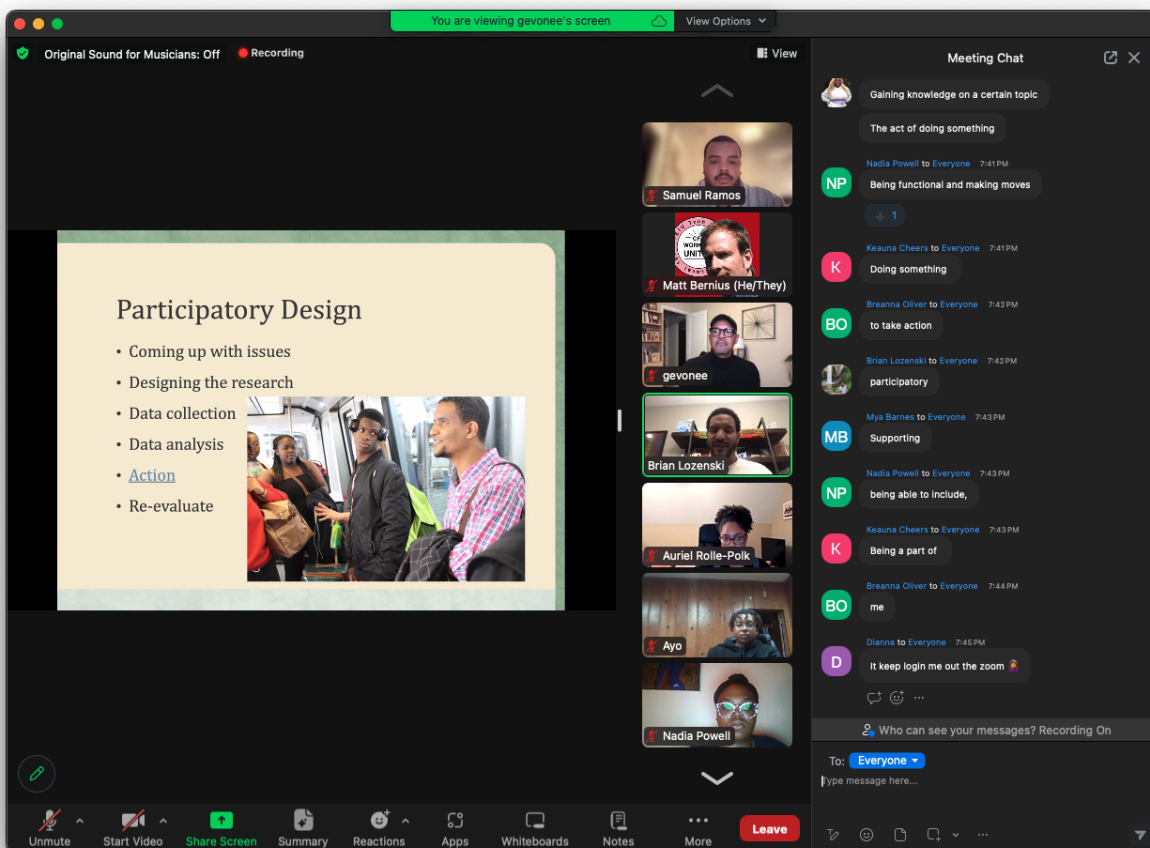
Once again, Tuesday and Thursday nights of this past week were spent with Gevonee Ford, Samuel Ramos, and Dr. Brian Lozenski from the [Network for the Development of Children of African Descent](#) (or NdCAD for short). Things started with our youth researchers sharing the results of their first mini-research project.

On the previous Thursday, the team from NdCAD introduced our researchers to a set of 21 Standards for Healthy Black Communities that were the output of a Participatory Action Research project done in Minneapolis. Over the weekend, the researchers interviewed family and friends about these standards and how they applied (or could apply) to the Shelby County Community.

On Tuesday night, the researchers discussed how those conversations went and reflected on how conducting those interviews led them to start thinking about their communities in different ways. For example, researcher Jerissa shared: *“I really learned a lot from interviewing several people about the 21 standards. It was interesting hearing how people felt about our community and what we should be doing to make it better. I know I’m going to try to use the standards in my life.”*



After those discussions, the rest of Tuesday’s class from this week featured Dr. Brian taking everyone through what Participatory Action Research is and how it’s done. The group also watched an excerpt from [a video about a YPAR project that Dr. Brian helped facilitate in Minneapolis](#).

Thursday night, we reviewed and discussed past YPAR projects from across the country, gathering ideas about how what they saw might be applied in Shelby County. The rest of the discussion was about the “Action” part of YPAR and how important it is to make sure that the results of their work can be used to help bring change to the community. The team from NdCAD also got the researchers thinking about finding different ways to share their results with Government Stakeholders and people within their communities and neighborhoods. Things wrapped up with some group reflection about the four training sessions. Here are some of the things that our researchers shared with the group:

“I really appreciated how this helped get us into the right headspace for this research. It’s important for us to tell our stories rather than letting other people do it for us. What’s in the history books isn’t always correct, and I didn’t start to realize that until I got to talk to people who lived through some of those events and times.”

“This helped remind me that we, as Black people, have a community where we can keep learning together and make results happen. We are in this together, and we can make things happen for ourselves.”

"I'm just starting my career as a teacher, and I learned a lot from these sessions. I'm already trying to integrate ideas we've discussed in my classroom."

Sneak peek for next week: Shelby YPAR on the Road

As we mentioned up top, some of the team is currently in New Orleans. A last-minute opportunity came up for us to send representatives from this project to the William Julius Wilson Institute's *Power in Place* convening. So Keauna Cheers from Beyond Educating and four of our researchers got in a van and headed down to the Big Easy to participate in training sessions and share what they are doing. Ayo McKinney is a recent graduate from Xavier University of Louisiana, where he studied psychology, history, and theology. During his undergrad, he researched Black identity and representation in the media. His research culminated in the publication of "Black Identity, Representation, and Identification in Comic Book Movies". Recognizing that research is best when in service to others, Ayo has committed to completing research that leads to tangible, lasting, and empowering change. Ayo currently works for TCB through AmeriCorps to help research and support advocacy pathways for program participants. Ayo grew up in Memphis, and he aims to give back to the city that gave him so much.



Virginia Carr Schneider is a doctoral student in Public Management and Policy at Georgia State University's Andrew Young School, where she studies poverty governance and administrative burden. Prior to beginning the PhD program, Virginia worked as a Project Coordinator for The Collective Blueprint, where she led the organization's measurement and evaluation (M+E) efforts, oversaw their admissions processes, and wrote grants. Virginia currently serves as an evaluation consultant and grant writer for TCB. Virginia firmly believes trusting relationships are a crucial part of effective anti-poverty work, and for this reason, she is committed to a mode of research that emphasizes the humanity of and is accessible to those at its center. Virginia is originally from Camden, Arkansas, and graduated from Rhodes College, where she majored in Political Science.
